Frozen Treats: Freeze small amounts of wet cat food or low-sodium chicken broth in ice cube trays. Offer them as occasional frozen treats for your cat to bat around and lick.

Scent Trails: Dab a favorite scent, like catnip or a bit of wet food, on various surfaces in your home to create a scent trail for your cat to follow.
